

## 5. Newman Clubs in September Meet

PORTSMOUTH, N.H., June 29 — More than 500 delegates representing 550 Newman Clubs from all parts of the United States are expected to attend the 37th annual convention of the Newman Club Federation September 6 to

several members of the Hierarchy, noted educators and 100 Newman Club chaplains will join student delegates in discussing the conference theme — "Aurageous Catholicism: Its Role in Secular Universities." Sessions will be held at the Wentworth-By-The-Sea-Hotel near Portsmouth. Pre-convention headquarters are at the University of New Hampshire, Durham.

Speakers will include Archbishop Richard J. Cushing of Boston and Bishops James E. Keenan of Rochester, Matthew F. Brady of Manchester, Russell J. Vinney of Providence, and John J. Wright of Worcester. Other New England Bishops have notified their intention to attend conference sessions.

Working with the New Hampshire committee in directing planning for the convention are Msgr. Joseph E. Schieder, Director of Youth Department, National Catholic Welfare Conference, the Rev. Edward J. Duncan, national chaplain of the Newman Club Federation, Gerard B. Nolan, federation president, and officers of the New England Province. The Rev. J. Desmond O'Connor is chaplain of the province.

## Socialization Plank Is Dropped From Platform

SYDNEY, Australia, July 1 — Catholic observers in Australia have noticed with interest the omission of the New Zealand Federation of Labor in eliminating the socialization objective from its constitution and platform.

The presence of the socialization objective—usually defined as the socialization of industry, production, distribution and exchange—the platform of political and industrial labor groups here has been a hotly debated question for many years, in which Catholics have played a key role.

## India Archbishop Enthroned At Delhi

NEW DELHI, India, July 1 — The Most Rev. Joseph A. Fernandez has been enthroned as Archbishop of Delhi and Simla at an impressive ceremony at the new cathedral.

Archbishop Fernandez arrived at the cathedral accompanied by Archbishop Leo P. Kierkels, Papal Internuncio to India, the Archbishops of Calcutta and Agra, the Bishops of Lucknow, Allahabad and Poona, the Prefect Apostolic of Jabalpur and the clergy of the archdiocese.

At a public reception later, the new Archbishop was welcomed on behalf of the clergy and laity by Msgr. John Burke, Vicar General of the archdiocese. Attending it were Chakravarti Rajagopalachari, Home Minister of India, and members of the diplomatic corps.

Archbishop Fernandez was born in Bangalore. He took his theological studies at the Kandy Papal Seminary and later was graduated from Oxford. He served in Calcutta for 30 years as secretary, vicar general and Auxiliary Bishop. The Archdiocese has a Catholic population of 9,727.

## Nevada Prelate 20 Years A Bishop

RENO, Nev., June 29 — The Most Rev. Thomas K. Gorman, first Bishop of the Reno diocese and a veteran of the American Catholic press, will celebrate the 20th year of his consecration to the Episcopacy on July 22.

Bishop Gorman was named to head the newly-founded Diocese of Reno in 1931. Since then the number of Catholics in his See and the number of parishes have more than doubled, and Catholic educational facilities have quadrupled in number.

Before becoming a Bishop he was editor for more than five years of The Tidings, Los Angeles archdiocesan newspaper, and during this period helped make the weekly one of the nation's leading Catholic papers. In 1935 he founded the Nevada Register, Reno diocesan newspaper, and he is its publisher. With this background in Cath-

## "O'CONNOR HOUSE" Something New in Schools

Situated on a height of land overlooking the City of Toronto is "O'Connor House." This is a country residence for a limited number of the students of De La Salle College, "Oaklands." It is not just another boarding school; it is something very new and different. To the boys who reside there it is, in every sense, a home.

"O'Connor House" is named after the late Senator Frank P. O'Connor, who willed the property to the Christian Brothers. This is a beautiful country estate. The house is colonial architecture and modern in every respect. Eight hundred acres of land surround the house, providing ample room for recreation and expansion. The house is well appointed with large bright rooms, ample bath-rooms, play-rooms, etc. Most bed rooms have baths attached and some have dressing-rooms. This residence is only seven miles from the city school and two miles from the city limits. Boys are transported to and from the City School in their private school bus.

"O'Connor House" is not managed along "institutional lines," rather it is along the lines of a well-ordered and regulated country home. The supervision is done by four members of the College Staff who live at "O'Connor House." To a very large extent the boys plan their own social and recreational activities, but over these there is a guiding hand of an experienced Staff Member. It is one of the aims of "O'Connor House" to train the students to be gentlemen in the real sense of the word. For this reason a limited number of social events are held at the residence. These are the high lights of the year.

De La Salle is most modern, having been completed only last September. It is the last word in school buildings. The course followed is that of the Province of Ontario which is accepted the world over. All the teaching is done by Christian Brothers. Both at "O'Connor House" and at De La Salle, gentlemanly behavior is stressed at all times.

Ample facilities are provided for recreation. The residence has a beautiful swimming tank attached to it.
